A few curriculum developments to share with you this term.

I'd like to start by letting you know that Katie Crozier was successfully appointed as the **Trust Primary Maths Director**. This means, from September, we will have more of Katie's time in our schools to support us on our maths journeys. She will be working 1 day a week in this role (alongside her maths hub work and teaching commitment). We are excited to see how this new role develops!



I'd like to say a big thank you to Emma Whitehead, our **Computing Lead**. She has been working for the Trust to develop our computing curriculum (no mean feat!) and she will be sharing this with you all as part of our Trust training day in April.

At a recent Head's meeting we agreed the need for a **Trust diversity lead** and I'm pleased to say that Michael Gray has taken this on. We are at the early stages of planning how this will be developed in our curriculum but we all agree how valuable this is. Each school will identify a named diversity lead, who Michael will work with.

Rebecca Gale, head of biology at Cambourne VC, has been working alongside Kirsty Allen, our Primary **science** leader to continue to improve the science provision across our schools. Rebecca put in a bid to The School Improvement Fund, and was successful in being granted money to help pay for some resources we need to improve the teaching of science.

We have just launched our **ETL** (Enhanced teaching and learning) course, with teachers across the Primary schools. attending This is the first cohort of delegates to take part in this newly designed course and I'm sure it will be really useful. The remaining 3 sessions will be held next term.

The **Trust training day** has a CPD focus and to compliment this, we will be having training about using iMovie within subjects. There will be an opportunity to discuss iPad use further in your network meetings via Teams following the training session. I hope you will all find the day really useful. Please make sure you have the links for the correct network meeting.

New Trust Subject Leader

Diversity Lead

Hello! My name is Michael Gray and I am delighted to be back working for the CAM academy trust and I am thrilled to become the trust diversity lead.

I have been working in primary education for over twelve years in schools across Hertfordshire and Cambridgeshire and spanning the primary age range. I have worked for two schools within the trust: Jeavons Wood and Gamlingay Village primary - both are amazing schools and have been fantastic places to work. I left the trust at the end of 2019 to become an English adviser for Herts for Learning before re-joining in January 2022 back at GVP - it's been like coming home!

During the last two years, I have been able to really focus on the issue of diversity which seems to have become far more prominent in schools. For me, this was all sparked by reading a book: The Binding by Bridget Collins. Unbeknownst to me, the central male characters in this book turned out to be gay and fall in love. Little did I know then, that reading that book during the first lockdown would trigger a whole lot of reflecting and thinking which ultimately led me to this point. As a gay man, this was the first time I had read a book in which I had seen myself reflected. I had never sought to read books with gay characters in before because I am quite confident in who I am and I never thought this to be important, but I was wrong! The experience was quite transformative and it got me thinking: What would my life be like now if had had the experience of reading books with gay characters in when I was a child?

Now, unfortunately, I grew up during the time of section 28 - a piece of legislation which made illegal the 'promotion of homosexuality as a pretended family structure'. Essentially, from 1988 until 2003, talking about gay people in schools was banned and along with it any kind of representation in books. Undoubtedly, this had a massive effect on me: the message was that I was abnormal and that was given to me from a very early age by the omission of representation of gay people from literature or any positive role models during my youth.

Having done a lot of research about this over the last couple of years and having spoken at conferences and having published articles on the subject, I have come to the conclusion that diversity needs to be integral in schools. No child should be made to feel how I did growing up and my mission is to ensure that as a trust, we provide opportunities to all children to see themselves reflected back through the books they read to ensure that they feel like they are a valued part of society no matter who they are of where they come from. I am not just passionate about LGBTQ+ inclusion (although that is what I most relate to) but ensuring the inclusion of all. For me, diversity should be the foundations of the curriculum. We need to ensure that through what we are teaching, all kinds of people are being represented and presented positively to the children we teach so that all children can see themselves and their families represented at some point during their time at primary school and to build a culture of tolerance, understanding and acceptance for others who may not have had the experience of other lived realities before.

Having put a lot of thought into all this in recent years, I am now very eager to actually make a difference on the ground. I can't wait to work with all the primaries in the trust on this and I hope that together, we can make a huge difference to the children and families we teach.

In a recent MFL CB23 meeting, Rachel Hawkes kindly directed us to some very useful documents and policies which can be found on the Rachel Hawkes website: rachelhawkes.com - Yr 3/4 Spanish and rachelhawkes.com - Yr 3/4 French

There is an example policy template available for schools as well as the new progression documents for primary languages. We discussed adding to the template a reference to the fact that a key aim of learning Spanish is making friends, so the sentence structures for conversation in some schools is being referred to as "friendship sentences"

It's been great to be able to get out and about (finally!) to share the use of Seesaw with other primaries in the trust too. Art

A quick update on Art and Design.

For schools that are using Kapow as part of their art curriculum (even if it's just to supplement), please be aware that Kapow is having a 'refresh'. You can currently access some of the new units and see the planned focus for those that are due for the end of July. These units will be the same focus for each year group:

Drawing

Painting and mixed media

Sculpture and 3D

Craft and design

Although it will be exciting to see some new lesson content, it is important to remember that skill and knowledge progression is still at the forefront of Ofsted deep dives and is an integral part of our primary academy vision. Children should have time to learn new, and develop existing skills and knowledge in all the formal elements each year, and then use and practise these throughout the year, using a range of mediums and exploring a wide range of artists.

I have contacted Kapow to find out if these new units will be replacing or supplementing the current unit, but am still awaiting an answer. I would recommend downloading all content you use, as well as supporting documentation.

History

It has been an exciting term for the development of history across our Trust. At Jeavons Wood, we have implemented the use of a Big Question cover page, in which children have a go at answering the big question for that unit both at the beginning of the topic and then again at the end of teaching. This has provided teachers, and myself as subject lead, with a clear overview of the progress which has been made by each child within that unit of work. It has also enabled us to plan responsively to directly meet the subject needs of our cohorts, and is just another step on our journey of assessment in our foundation subjects.

We have rolled out the use of IPads across Jeavons Wood over the last term and it has been so exciting to see how these have been used to support and enhance learning within history. These have been used as an adaptive teaching tool in order to allow all children to achieve an objective. We are using the Dictation tool, Clickr, notes and iMovie to allow children to prove and demonstrate their learning in a range of accessible ways. It has been wonderful to see the historical abilities of children who otherwise would find a written task a barrier to their learning. We are excited to share some of these new ideas with the other Trust schools during our Summer term trust training day.

In recent weeks I have also had the pleasure to visit other schools in the trust, where we have worked together to continue the development of our history curriculums. Schools are working so hard to develop a knowledge and skills rich curriculum which provides coverage, progression and opportunities for all children. I very much look forward to continuing our collaborative approach to developing our curriculums both in person and via our Teams chat throughout the rest of the year.
